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

Beloved, God is constantly calling us to examine things from shoes other than our own, we just prefer our own slippers most of the time. Yet, in our increasingly pluralistic society we must be willing try on those other shoes if for no other reason than to be able to engage in conversation with our neighbors. It is inconsequential whether we like the multi-cultural society that we inhabit, for that ship has most assuredly sailed and is never returning. It is consequential whether we will be conversant with other perspectives so as to be better equipped to share the love and joy that is found in a relationship with Jesus for that is truly at the end of the day, at the end of time, all that will matter.

Additionally, it is helpful to remember that simply because we are going through a particular season of life it does not mean that everyone else is accompanying us. Just as our neighbors in the Southern Hemisphere are in a completely different climatological season than us, so too can our neighbors and friends be experiencing a completely different life season along with entirely different sets of priorities, emotions, and experiences. Just was we cannot wrench the Southern Hemisphere out of winter until this globe we inhabit spins around, so too must our friends and neighbors walk through the season they find themselves. It is incumbent on us however, to provide a listening ear, attempt to inhabit their space with them that they may experience the ministry of presence, and above all respect their journey by offering kindness and compassion.

I believe by doing so we will make all the seasons of life easier to handle and for those who are not looking forward to this upcoming winter, make it a little more bearable as well, by creating a nice equilibrium for all to enjoy.

When I am afraid, I put my trust in You. (Psalm 56:3)

Sometimes profound truths are packaged in simple statements. Take this verse, for example. It's just 10 words. It only takes a second to read, and on the surface, it seems pretty simple. "When I'm afraid, I'll trust You. Got it."

When you think about it, though, this truth is much easier to say than it is to do. It's easy to say that we trust God, no matter what. But, what happens when the smoke alarm wakes us up in the middle of the night? What happens when the car starts going sideways on a slick road? How about when the doctor's office calls and the voice on the other end of the phone says, "We need to talk about your test results?"

It's easy to trust when no trust is required. Anyone can say they trust God when everything is going well. But when everything is crashing around us? That's different.

How do we trust God when the world is on fire around us?

We have to understand that trust is not a feeling. It's a decision, an act of the will. Trust is something we decide to do, not something we feel. It's a skill to develop, a "muscle" that needs to be exercised in order to grow.

I believe that an essential first step in trusting is to stop. Instead of immediately going into panic mode and reacting out of fear, it's essential to stop for a moment and take a breath.

While we're stopped, we need to take a moment to consider where to place our trust. It's not about depending on our own strength or on the faithfulness of our friends. It's not about looking to the government or to karma to fix the problem. Instead, we need to decide to place our trust in the living, loving, omnipresent, omnipotent Father. We need to remind ourselves that whatever is going on is certainly not bigger than Him.

Sometimes this first step - to stop and consider - may only take a moment. Sometimes it may take much longer. But don't rush it. Take a moment to call to mind a verse of Scripture (like the one above) and breathe out a quick prayer - or even a longer one if

Personally, I'm learning that once I stop and consider, I have a much better idea about how to react. Remembering Who God is and calling to mind what He has promised - seeking His face and His guidance - may not put out the fire surrounding me, but it gives me what I need to deal with it.

When we learn how to trust - when we grow to understand that trust is a decision, a strategy, a practice - that begins to change how we see times of difficulty. We may not ever feel good about our struggles, but at least we can begin to see them as opportunities to grow.
